

Term 2 e-Report Cards

will be available for parents and students, via your MyClass account, the afternoon of Friday, March 15.



Most of you have already created a MyClass account. MyClass is a separate system from the School District Parent Portal. If you require additional assistance in setting up an account, email MyClass@sd42.ca or go to the following School District 42 link https://myedbc.sd42.ca/MyClass.

The school no longer hands out printed copies of report cards. The e-Report will only be available for 30 calendar days; therefore, it is important to save and print a copy for your records.

Grade 7 Day - May 29

Grade 7 Day is on **Wednesday May 29**, for the full day, 8:45am to 2:00pm. This is the day where incoming grade 7 students for September 2019 attend to get a feel of what high school will be like, meet the teachers and get familiar with PMSS.

These students will fill in for our current grade 8 students, so there will be no classes for our grade 8 students this day.

Flex Time

Please note that students have flex time each day from 9:35-10:35. As flex is considered instructional time, it is mandatory for all students to attend the flex block. Students may use flex time to work on projects, receive help from a teacher, work collaboratively on projects or explore passion projects. At various times throughout the year, there may be special flex activities, such as gingerbread house design, that require advanced sign up. Special assemblies and presentations are also schedule during flex time. For the week following spring break, students are required to attend the assigned flex block. For example, if they have Ms. Jones for Block B and it is Flex B, they will be required to go to Flex B with Ms. Jones. As always, teachers will take attendance. During the week of April 8-12, flex will resume as usual and students will once again choose one of their teachers to go to during the Flex block. It is important to understand that, as flex is instructional time, a teacher can require a student to attend their assigned flex block at their discretion.

Student Council

Student Council President, Makena McLean and her amazing team of Student Council members have had a busy year so far. Their mandate is to improve the physical space of the school as well as boosting school spirit and creating opportunities for the student population to follow their passions. This group is responsible for lobbying for school improvements such as repairs to the washrooms, bringing in a filtration system for the water fountain, funding clubs and organizing spirit weeks as well as raising awareness for mental health and anti-bullying initiatives. This team of individuals from grade 8 to 11 have been meeting with Ms. Wallisch every Monday to implement a plan to improve their school and help make a difference in our school community. New members are always welcome to join. Meetings are after school in the library.

Link Crew

This year's Link Crew program is winding down and invitations will soon be going out to grade 10 and 11 students who may be good candidates to join the program for next year. Link Crew is a program where senior leaders mentor grade 8s in an effort to make the transition from elementary to secondary school as seamless as possible. There will be an information meeting during FLEX on Tuesday, April 16th in the library.

The New Canada's Food Guide - What do the changes mean to your family?

The new <u>Canada's Food Guide</u> helps support healthy eating for you and your family. With the new changes, it's the perfect time to create new habits one small step at a time. Here are some of the more significant changes:

Healthy Food Choices

 The four food groups have been replaced with a picture of a healthy plate. Aim to fill half of your plate with a variety of vegetables and fruits, and the other half with equal amounts of protein and whole grain foods.



- Milk products are now listed as a source of protein along with beans, nuts, seeds, lean meats, fish, and eggs.
 - o Continue to enjoy lower fat dairy products (i.e. milk, yogurt and cheese). Dairy products provide important nutrients like calcium and vitamin D for your family.
 - Choose protein food that comes from plants more often. These delicious <u>recipes</u> include options for plant-based meals.
- Fruit juice is now recognized as a sugary drink along with iced tea, chocolate milk and soft drinks. Sugary drinks are not recommended; make water the drink of choice.

Healthy Eating Habits

The new Food Guide explains "how" to eat healthy in addition to "what" to eat. Here are a couple of examples:

- **Cook more often.** Children like to be included in the <u>planning and preparation of meals</u>. It helps build their confidence and cooking skills, and is a great way to connect with your child. The new Food Guide includes tips on <u>preparing meals</u> with kids.
- **Eat meals with your family** and be free from distractions such as electronic devices or television.

The Redesigned Curriculum at Pitt Meadows Secondary

ABORIGINAL WORLDVIEWS & PERSPECTIVES IN THE CLASSROOM First Peoples principles of learning

From kindergarten to graduation, students will experience Aboriginal perspectives and understandings as an integrated part of their learning journey. The inclusion of Indigenous ways of knowing and being is based on the understanding that Aboriginal perspectives and knowledge are a part of the historical and contemporary foundation of BC and Canada.

An important goal in integrating Aboriginal perspectives into curricula is to ensure that all learners have opportunities to understand and respect their own cultural heritage as well as that of others. There are two important aspects to embedding these principles of learning into classroom experiences. First, all students will be celebrated as individuals in a strength-based, learner-centred environment and second, all students will be nurtured in their understanding of the healing around Truth and Reconciliation.

Redesigned Curriculum: Know-Do-Understand

All areas of learning are based on a "Know-Do-Understand" model to support a concept-based, competency-driven approach to learning. In this model, three elements work together to support deeper learning: Content (Know), Curricular Competencies (Do), and Big Ideas (Understand). BC's new curriculum design enables a personalized, flexible and innovative approach at all levels of the education system. All areas of learning have been redesigned using this model.
